
Bike Day at the library!

Join us at the library each week for stories and activities with an Interpretive Ranger from Glacier Bay National Park, followed by games, music, and other projects.


Reading Buddies: sign up at the library to be paired with a Reading Buddy. For every hour your read with your buddy, you will receive a prize!

*Ages are recommended as activities will be planned to be developmentally appropriate for these age groups. However, children of any age may attend any (or all) programs.

Attendance Awards: Any child that attends a program every week throughout the summer (10 weeks) can sign up to receive a book of their choice up to \$25!

A note to parents: the library is not able to provide one-on-one supervision of children, and we will not require children to stay at the library during these programs. Participants are expected to behave appropriately in the library and will be asked to leave if they are unable to follow library expectations. If you do not feel comfortable with your child leaving the library on their own, please ensure they attend library programs with an adult responsible for them.




Yours librarians will be attending The














NEW IN ADULT FICTION:

I also read Jimmy O. Yang's memoir *How to American*. I enjoyed parts of this book, especially reading about his transition as a preteen from Hong Kong to America. However, the pacing and humor were a little off for me. To be fair, I have never watched any of Jimmy O. Yang's comedy, so this may be part of why this book didn't quite "do it" for me.


Finally, I read a juvenile fiction book called *Silo and the Rebel Raiders*, (Veronica Peyton), a lovely whimsical and snarky futuristic novel about a boy who can see the future, which just dragged on about a hundred pages too far for me. *Sigh* there's always next month. -Jen

As promised, I read and thoroughly enjoyed one of my nonfiction picks of the month, *It's All Relative* by A.J. Jacobs. You might remember him from his *Year of Living Biblically* or *Know it All*.

In his books, Jacobs takes a theory of his and researches it heavily, this time his focus is on family, or rather, his idea of the Global Family Tree. It is his feeling that we are all related genetically, and are, in fact, cousins. And if we are all cousins, shouldn't we treat each other nicely? The idea that once the world realizes that we are all family, we won't be such a dysfunctional society. A society in crisis.

Despite that heavy thought, this book is bursting with humor, which is one of the reasons I picked it up – it did not fail! Added Bonus: a pic of Daniel Radcliffe holding a sign saying that We Are Cousins! And yes! We are all related to an ancient king, Cleopatra and/or Kevin Bacon. Informative read that I very much enjoyed, so much so, I bought a copy for my grandma!
