So far, we have hosted three summer reading events for children and one NPS Discovery Day, with a total of 94 attendees. In addition, 46 readers of all ages have signed up to work on their Star Chart, earning prizes or raffle tickets as they read and engage in other learning activities of their choice.

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

Reporting Back from the Small Libraries Institute of Management

In late May, we (Jen and Bre) attended SLIM, a weeklong training course led by the Alaska State Library specifically for library administrators in small rural Alaskan communities without a Master's Degree.

The training was a crash course in everything from materials selection, to understanding copyright laws, to accessing online databases, to developing library policies. Additionally we had the opportunity to tour the Mendenhall Public Library in Juneau, collaborate with and learn from other librarians from similar communities across the state, and have some hands-on time developing practical resources to utilize in our library.


Your librarians have been kept busy upon their return by the online component of the training, and in implementing a lot of the skills we learned. We have begun the process of rewriting outdated policies and procedures, and revamping our selection and weeding process for books and DVDs.

We hope to continue to make the library more accessible and geared toward the specific needs of our community, while ensuring that we comply with State and Federal requirements. As always, we encourage community feedback about our library, its materials, and its programs.


Check out eBooks and audiobooks for free!


Dread Nation by Justina Ireland


Calypso by David Sedaris

Librarian Reads



I devoted the month to a long, but worthwhile novel by Elizabeth Kostova, called The Shadow Land. The story began by following a young traveler, just off the plane in Bulgaria, and still reeling from the death of her brother. She helps a family into a taxi, and inadvertently winds up with one of their bags, containing an urn of ashes. The next week sends her on quest across Bulgaria to return the urn to the family, while slowly unraveling the dark and tragic history of the man contained within it. As strange things start happening to the young woman, she realizes that she may not be carrying just an urn, but a complicated secret that may be putting her in grave danger in this unknown world. Long, but worth the read!

Are you a feminist? Do you also enjoy the works of the masterful storyteller, Stephen King? Sleeping Beauties might be the summer read that you're looking for, especially if you have a big beach bag. This one is no different from all the rest, topping out at a solid 5 pounds and 700 pages, leading to the decision to borrow from the digital library. © What if, one day, there were no more women? As the earth orbits the sun, bringing a new day across the globe, women are falling asleep and forming cocoons. Their new reality: living peacefully in an alternate universe. Some women hold out for days - I learned a lot about meth in this book-leaving men in wonder and agitation. Those cruel or desperate enough to disturb their women are in for a nasty surprise (guess what, more than once!) With women absent, some men are working to solve the mystery, some take advantage of the situation - but all turn to violence. Can they save the women they need to make their world balanced again? Will the women decide to leave their peaceful, testosterone-less new home where they discovered that they are capable on their own? To King, ladies are equal.




