
Last Month at a Glance




Left: Lego fun at the library! Kids and teens are invited to attend Lego Fridays with Annie 2:30-4pm through the end of December.

Library PFAS Test Results

Shannon & Wilson, Inc. collected a water sample on August 28, 2018 from the well at the Gustavus Public Library. Below are the analytical results for the water-supply well at 14 Gustavus Road:

Results of the analysis conducted by TestAmerica Laboratories, Inc. indicate that PFOS was detected at an estimated 1.5 ppt and PFHxS was detected at an estimated 1.1 ppt in the water sample collected at the Gustavus Public Library. The sum of these compounds is less than the ADEC action level.

Note: There is a Berkey water filter available in the library meeting room to the right of the sink.

Endowment Grant News


This month, the Gustavus City Council awarded the Gustavus Public Library \$2,902.60, to be spent on a logo design for the library and starting up the 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Program at the library.

The 1000 Books Before Kindergarten
Program is an early literacy program which
encourages parents and caregivers of young
children to read with their child, and helps them
keep track of how many books they are reading
together. The goal of the program is to promote
reading to young children and encourage
parent/child bonding through reading. The
Endowment Grant funding will help us develop
the resources we need to get this program up
and running, advertise the program in the
community, and purchase small incentives for
participants.

The new logo design will be used to create library book bags, which will be utilized as incentive prizes in our library programming (including the 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Program), as well as for fundraising purposes to support the library as a whole.

We are excited to have the opportunity to pursue this project, and aim to have the 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Program up and running in time for the start of the 2019 school year.






BOOK CLUB NEWS






