**A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE SUBMISSION OF A CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT  
FUNDING REQUEST FOR THE REPLACEMENT OF THE DISPOSAL AND RECYCLING  
CENTER'S SKID-STEER LOADER**

**WHEREAS**, The City of Gustavus Disposal and Recycling Center (DRC) serves Gustavus as a model Integrated Resource Recovery and Waste Disposal Facility; and

**WHEREAS**, the DRC is totally dependent on its skid-steer loader, which is used to handle baled recyclables, baled trash, palletized materials, food waste, composted food waste, wood chips and is used extensively for site work and the plowing of snow at the DRC facility; and

**WHEREAS**, the existing skid-steer loader is now 20 years old and requires more frequent repairs; and

**WHEREAS**, a skid-steer loader figures centrally in our planning for efficient and effective service to our community for the foreseeable future; and now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED** that the Gustavus City Council approves and prioritizes as Number 2, the FY16 CIP funding request to the Alaska Legislature in the amount of \$49,000, to be matched with \$7,000 from City reserves, for the purchase of a replacement skid-steer loader, and urges the Legislature and Governor to consider it favorably.
